#### Read

Please read the verses listed above three times from at least two different translations. It is recommended to use at least one 'word for word' translation (NKJV, NASB, ESV) and at least one 'thought by thought' translation (NLT, NIV, CSB). Meditate and pray on the passage.

## **Cultural Snapshot/Historical Background**

Paul wraps up his first letter to the Corinthian church by focusing on questions asked of him regarding charity for the poorer believers in Jerusalem. What lessons could we learn from these 4 verses that could be applicable to today? Dive deep into the text and other places in the Bible and share your findings with your group during the last night of study.

Paul signs off with some personal plans, some final exhortations, and "farewell for now". We know he plans to visit them again!
